Moving people forward is a vision!

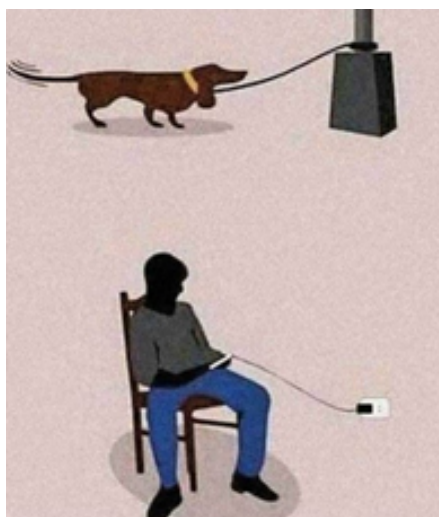
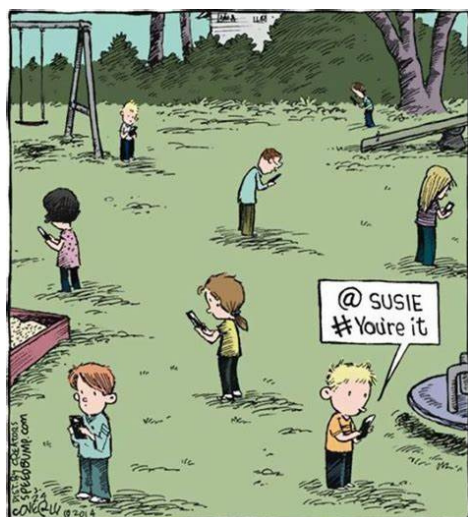
As we begin the summer series of both online and in-church worship, it would

Some parishioners have written in earlier copies of "The Voice" about their pets – well this is about a different type of litter. With Covid 19 having taken over much of our daily life and routines for over a year, an ease in lockdown comes as a welcome relief. Under guide lines we can go out for walks, meet people and have the odd takeaway coffee. Portstewart Community Association has been busy and had organised a litter cleanup in our lovely town on 17/04/21 between 10am and 11am. What better way to get out into the fresh air, have a good walk, meet other people and do something useful at the same time! (Adhering to Covid 19 guidelines) We met at the bandstand at the Crescent and Nigel Handforth supplied us with picking lances, high viz jackets, bin bags and took a note of names etc and the areas to be covered. Around 40 volunteers turned up, women, men and children of all ages and different nationalities all keen to tidy up. We covered the lower prom along the rocks, cliff walk, harbour hill, along the sea shore as far as Amici. Lever Road, Strand Road, Church Street and the lane off Mill Road (which was littered with bottles), to name but a few. Even with the Council providing extra bins in the area, 40 bags of rubbish were collected. Lots of discarded face masks, cable ties, plastic bottles, crisp packets, glass bottles, beverage takeaway cups, napkins etc. were collected. It was satisfying to have had a hand in tidying up our town. It is the intention apparently with the ease in lockdown that PCA will try to have this event each month, so keep a lookout for the notice on social media. Take care everyone.

➔ IN CHURCH WORSHIP GOING FORWARD

The re-opening of in church worship in our quarters has been very successful in May with each Sunday being full to capacity. Given that we cannot predict for the next three months how restrictions will be lifted the following decisions have been made by the Select Vestry.

June - Continue in quarters each Sunday

July - Continue in quarters each Sunday

August - Continue in quarters each Sunday



If we need to change because restrictions reduce to 1m or disappear, we will bring them into effect on the 1st Sunday of the next month. The announcement of any such change would be communicated on the church notice boards, on our facebook page and on the parish website.

➔ SAFEGUARDING TRUST

In accordance with the recommendations in "Safeguarding Trust, the Church of Ireland Code of Good Practice for Ministry with Children" a Parish Panel has been appointed to implement some of the responsibilities identified in the Code. These include:

- Interviewing persons willing to serve as workers in the parish
- Advising workers on their responsibilities in respect of the Code
- Being an immediate contact point for workers when a suspicion, complaint or allegation of child abuse is made about a worker with children on parish premises or in a parochial organisation, in accordance with the procedures set out in these guidelines
- Advising the Select Vestry in respect of its responsibilities

True & Lively Words Reading Group

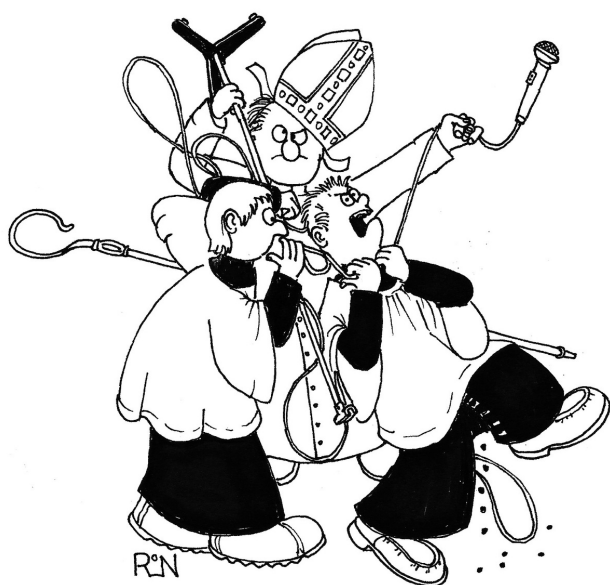

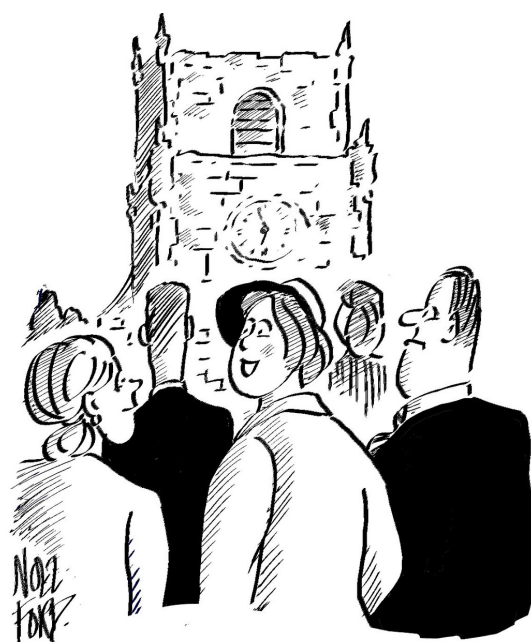

PARISH NURSES UPDATE *By Noelle McNinch*

When Eileen and I started working in Agherton little did we know what lay ahead. Instead of the planned Mother's Union meeting on 16th March we received the news that all was cancelled.

We gathered all our necessities, taking them home to our makeshift offices. Over the past year we have had many phone conversations, provided proactive and reactive advice, organised supplies of food and medicines, supported parishioners in time of grief, made referrals and took part in online services. It has been our privilege to have had the chance to be part of this service and, although not ideal by phone, we stood in faith that God would direct our paths and He has.

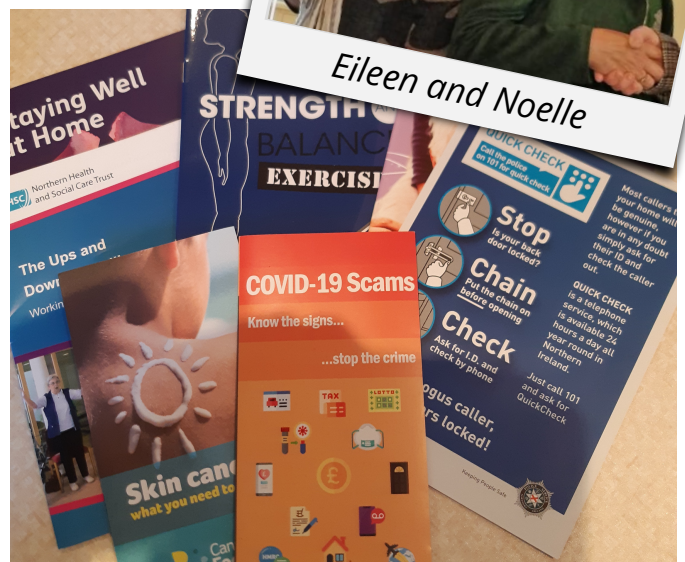
In an effort to combat loneliness and empower the recipients during the pandemic we created and delivered activity bags, taking all necessary COVID precautions. Bags were distributed on four occasions, each season had a theme and each bag had a gift, tasks to complete, health information and a spiritual reflection.

Autumn (care of self) included hand cream, puzzle books, leaflets on fire safety, wellbeing, gentle exercises. Interaction with Sunday surfers via encouragement cards and messages.

Winter (care of birds/animals) included candy canes, tissues, a decoration to give to someone, fat balls/cereals to assemble for birds, leaflets on home accident prevention, carbon monoxide awareness and Christmas safety.

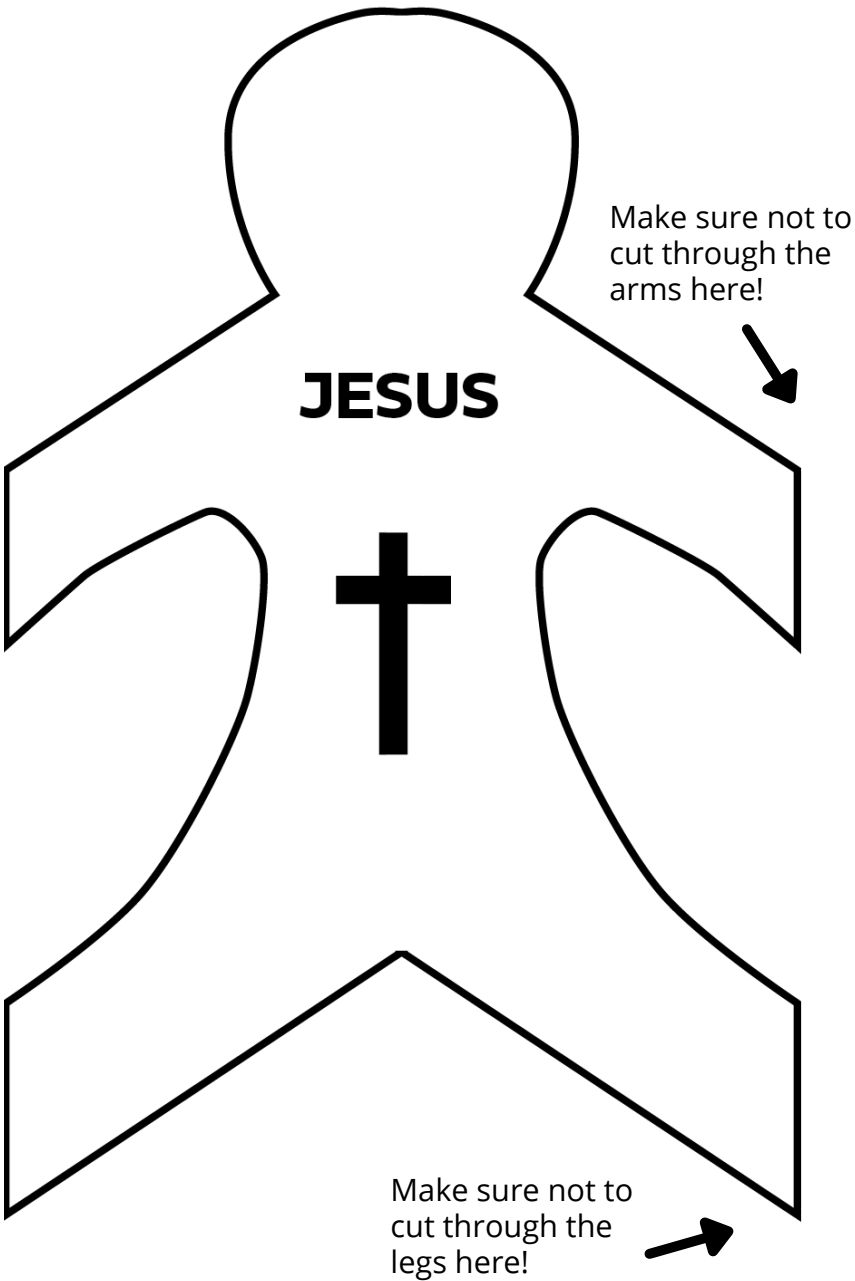
Spring (observe newness of nature) included Smarties with task card, sunflower seeds, a knitted cross, leaflets on sun safety, COVID scams.

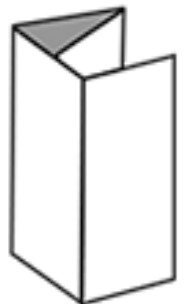

➔ QUESTION TIME - LEISA DUFFY

Can you tell our readers a bit about your background?

My family link to Agherton and Portstewart stretches back to my great, grandmother, Alice Orr Campbell, who was born in 1879 and baptised in Agherton. Both of my parents were in the Church Choir (41 years later and my mum is still there!) and I was baptised and confirmed in Agherton. I studied at Ulster University where I gained a degree in Visual Communication. I lived and worked in Belfast for 12 years but returned to Portstewart in 2005 when I went into business for myself as a graphic designer.



What attracted you to working in the parish office?

I enjoy connecting and communicating with people and I found that working from home combined with lockdown had left me very bored and isolated. My mum happened to mention that the church was looking for an office administrator and the idea of doing a job that involved working closely with the parish community while putting my design skills to use really appealed to me. I was delighted to be offered the post.

What is your typical day like?

I'm not sure I have a typical day at the moment, although I think that will change once the restrictions are lifted. I am working mainly from home so it's very important to be able to keep connected with each other through the online technology that we have. I deal with all the enquiries that come through by email, post or over the telephone and after that, every day is totally different! I could be designing posters one minute and then coordinating the running order for the online broadcasts the next. That's what's so great about the job, it definitely keeps me on my toes!

What are the challenges of your job and which aspects do you enjoy?

The main challenges so far have been preparing the online services for compline and holy week. Having never used any movie making software before I was completely thrown in at the deep end but with help of Revd Malcolm and the broadcast team, I was able to cobble together the first compline broadcast and then progressed on to the nightly holy week broadcasts, after that I could nearly give Steven Spielberg a run for his money! I find the work interesting and varied and I enjoy being able to use my design skills to help connect and communicate with the parish.

Almost all your time in post has been during the unusual circumstances of lockdown. Are you looking forward to experiencing the role in more normal times?

I'm looking forward to the restrictions easing and meeting everyone from all the groups that will be starting back again. The office is missing the energy and buzz of people and although I have already met a few parishioners I am looking forward to meeting more of you in the near future!

P.S. I'd like to say thank you to Alicean Handforth for all her help and kindness during handover and the last few months... I've got big boots to fill!

➔ AGHERTON BRANCH MOTHERS' UNION



All Ireland President June has embarked on her "21 in 21" campaign, walking 21 kilometres in each of the 12 dioceses in Ireland to raise money for the All-Ireland "Mums in May" fund. This fund, originally set up in 2014, helps supports local MU projects and an All-Ireland fundraising campaign is organised every three years specifically for "Mums in May".

AIP June aims to achieve her "21 in 21" by walking three separate seven-kilometre walks in each diocese and has asked Connor to identify and plan the walks for this diocese. The number walking with AIP June will depend on whatever is allowed at the time of each walk but at the moment, June aims to walk only with one other person and she would like to start and end her walk each day in a church for a short time of reflective prayer. A small working group in Connor MU has identified the following walks:

- **Belfast** - City walk from Stranmillis to St Anne's Cathedral on Tuesday 13th April, 10:30hrs
- **North Connor** - the coastal path from Portrush to Portstewart, starting at Holy Trinity Church, Portrush and finishing in Agherton Church, Portstewart on Monday 26th April, 10:00hrs
- **Mid Connor** - from St Jude's Church, Muckamore to All Saints' Antrim (Date TBC)

Walk 2 'Mums in May' Walk in North Connor Diocese

Our party of walkers met on a sunny Monday morning at Holy Trinity Parish Church in Portrush. The rector, Canon Peter McDowell set us on our way with the Mothers' Union Prayer. Our group included All Ireland President June, Regional coordinator for National Churches Trust Nina, Kim & Alicean from Agherton Parish and Jean & Kay from Ballywillan Parish.

The walk took us along the promenade towards the coastal walk leading to Portstewart. The sea breezes were gentle and refreshing as we made our way along. Beautiful yellow gorse, wild violets, sea pinks and red campion created a lovely backdrop on one side with the crashing sea and swooping kittiwakes, cormorants, gulls on the other.

Along the way we came across a little card with a photograph of a lost sheep, but thankfully our little flock knew where they were heading. We passed the grave of the unknown sailor, which has been tended by local people for about 200 years and a piece of war time history in the form of a giant arrow that the RAF used to get their bearings on the way to protect the convoys in the North Atlantic during the second World War conflict.

The time passed quickly, and we hardly noticed the 2 hours disappearing during our socially distanced walk, it was very enjoyable to meet other members and to learn a little bit about each other.

Our walk took us along the promenade in Portstewart and then the cliff walk as far as the old Ice House used for hundreds of years by the local fishing community.

We arrived at Agherton Parish Church around midday and were met by Revd Malcolm Ferry, his wife Carol and another Agherton branch member Rosemary. Connor Diocesan President Sally and her husband Bob joined the walking group at Agherton, and we were directed to socially distanced seating. The small group sat back to listen to a recording of Agherton's Lockdown Choir performing Allegri's Miserere Mei, Deus, Revd Malcolm then gave a short reflection based on the church windows, paying particular attention to the feet of the images represented. We closed with a prayer followed by the Mothers' Union prayer again.

All Ireland President June said a few words about the Mums in May 21 initiative and encouraged all present to take this back to their branch members.

Jake was counting down the days during lockdown until he could get back on the golf course and has played nearly every day since restrictions were lifted.



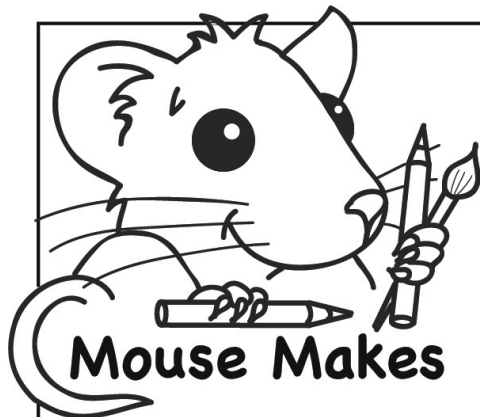
KATIE

➔ CONNECTING IN THE COMMUNITY *By Mrs Kathryn Taylor - Principal*

During the Covid-19 pandemic, Portstewart Primary School decided to incorporate the use of an underutilised polytunnel into the daily routines of those children who attended school over the lockdown period. Each week Governors and staff helped to facilitate groups of children to sow and maintain the polytunnel.

The emphasis was on growing vegetable and fruit crops to develop children's enjoyment and wonder of nature and to contribute positively to their mental health and well-being. The project expanded and a waste area was transformed into a vegetable patch including over 100 potato plants, cabbage, beetroot, and swede crops as well as a composting area and wildflower garden. The children took great pleasure developing their gardening skills and through perseverance and teamwork their sense of self-worth increased knowing they were contributing tangibly to the success of the garden.

The school community was kept up-to-date about the success of the outdoor learning project and parents/carers, families, local companies and residents volunteered help and advice. Each family was able to access the poly tunnel which provided a new place to be during the intensive home school learning period and many families reported that their children loved the quality time spent in the outdoor space with their parents. In addition to children and staff being able to consume the produce grown, the school was able to reach out into the community and offer local families some free, fresh food.

The high levels of involvement from the wider school community has been a success with enriching experiences brought to the children. The feedback from children, parents and staff has been very positive and the school looks forward to further embedding its work on developing the learning experiences of children through nurturing links with the wider community. The Covid-19 pandemic has brought many disruptions to the children's learning; however, Portstewart Primary School has turned challenge to opportunity by growing its community outreach and providing the children (and their families) with fruitful learning experiences that they can enjoy together.

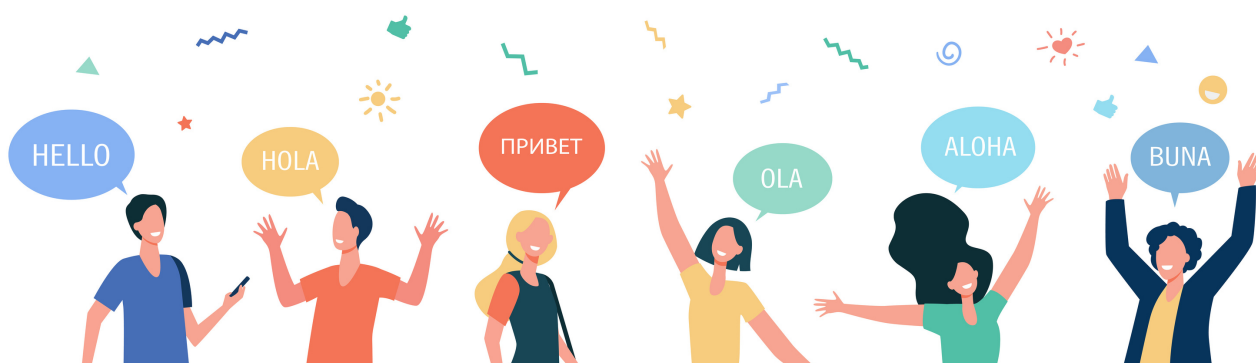
